I found some interesting facts about July too, some old folk laws for weather prediction:- *"if the first of July be rainy weather, twill rain for four weeks more or less together"* or for St Swithens day, 15<sup>th</sup> July:- *"St Swithens day if thou dost rain, for forty days it will remain, St Swithens day if thou be fair, for forty days twill rain nae mair"* J

Also, did you know that on 1<sup>st</sup> July 1937 our brilliant 999 services was introduced, and 100 years previously with the beginning of the registration of marriages, births and deaths. 2<sup>nd</sup> July 1928, equal voting rights were granted for women and 13<sup>th</sup> July 1985 was the famous live aid concert organised by Sir Bob Geldof. Apollo 11 landed on the moon on 21<sup>st</sup> July 1969 making Neil Armstrong the first man to walk on the moon. 25<sup>th</sup> July is marked as St James day (patron saint of Pilgrims) and the official start to the UK's oyster season and the date is also St Christopher's Day, the Patron Saint of travellers.

For you spud lovers out there, the first potato arrived from Columbia on 28<sup>th</sup> July 1586, and yesteryear changed on 28<sup>th</sup> July 1901 was when the first finger prints were used for identification purposes.

Finally, July Birthdays include:- Princess Diana, Tom Cruise, Tom Hanks, Kevin Hart, Daniel Radcliffe, Margot Robbie, Mick Jagger, Pamela Anderson and our lovely Beverly Martin (plus Paul Amor and Lisa Baker!)

The symbolised flower of July is Delphinium & Water Lily and the gemstone is the beautiful Ruby.

As I am writing this, we have around 4 weeks to go before the Street Fair on the **26<sup>th</sup> July**, and keeping all fingers and toes crossed for good weather; we have booked no rain and not too hot or too cold!

Don't forget that we are opening the Street Fair an hour earlier than we have done in the past, as we have tended to have a bit of a gathering at the top and bottom of The Street trying to get in early. The opening times this year will be **10am to 5pm**. Posters advertising the Street Fair will be starting to go up this weekend and Carl has been very busy advertising the event on social media.

We have put a flyer through every letter box in The Street, with details of the day and parking arrangements. If for some reason you haven't seen your flyer, please do give me a call and I can email you a copy.

As per my last article, we ask all Street residents to move their cars to the sports field for the duration of the Street Fair, preferably the evening before, as stall holders tend to arrive very early to set up their pitches.

It gets very, very busy in the morning, although we do enforce a strict route in and circuit for stall holders to minimise disruption. We will have someone providing overwatch of the Sports Field for the night.

For residents of the parish of Milton Abbas entry is free for the household with up to two additional free tickets for visiting relatives. We will be giving out wristbands to those who will be visiting the Fair which you can use on the day to gain free entry. We operate this system on a trust basis and would ask everyone not to ask for more wristbands than resident family members and a maximum of two visiting relatives. The Street Fair charity raises funds for many local good causes and every free ticket reduces the money we have available to give to our beneficiaries.

We also have a number of 18<sup>th</sup> Century costumes and items available. Please come along at the same time as the wristband collection timings below; perhaps you need an apron or cap; come along and see what we have to offer.



If you would like to collect your wristbands (and/or costume items) for free entry, a member of the organising committee will be in the Almshouse Reading Rooms (building opposite the church) at the following times (free entry will not be available on the day, so please don't forget!):

## Milton Abbas Local History Group

For the 2025 Street Fair we are planning to have an exhibition in the south aisle of St James'. Come and see our new information on LiDAR mapping and Metal Detecting Finds. We hope to see you there, do pop in and say hello.

I note that 377 acres of freehold woodland have been sold by the Forestry Commission by auction of Symonds and Sampson on June 5 for  $\pounds$ 175 000. I wonder what will happen to this land which was previously open to the public? Let us know if you have any information. I have added this to the Timeline of Milton Abbas History.

At our next meeting on **Wednesday 2 July** at **7pm** in the **Reading Rooms** we have an outside speaker, David Beaton, giving a presentation on Dorset Heroines. This will be the last meeting of this season whilst we take a break until 3 September. We are busy working on the programme of talks and if any of our readers have ideas on Milton Abbas history please get in touch via our website.

The day after David Beaton's talk one of our members will be giving a presentation to the Sydling St Nicholas Historical Society on the Deserted Medieval Village of Eliston, which was in the Heart of the Sydling Valley. More details on our website <u>blog</u>. This is just one of many DMV's which were once on the estate of Milton Abbey and they provide much interest for researchers. Another is at Lyscombe, as noted in the June Bulletin, and another of our members has identified the location of the medieval houses using LiDAR.

Whilst visiting Athelhampton House I purchased a copy of 'Anne of Athelhampton and the Riddle of the Apes'. The author is Giles Keating, current owner of the house. This fictional book tells the story of Anne and John Tregonwell of Milton Abbas. The author has done much research and might be a useful contact.

There is more information on the Athelhampton website.

Another local history group, Tolpuddle, are interested in the visit of King Edward VII to Milton Abbas in 1909. We will be sharing information with them and possibly share talks.

# Thought for the Month

St. James and the Scallop Shell: A Story Rooted in Milton Abbas

Last week I went to the cinema to watch the Salt Path. This adaption of Raynor Winn's book is a powerful true story following the author and her husband as they walk the South West Coast Path after losing their home and livelihood. Along the way, they battle harsh weather, ill health and the physical demands of the journey, finding healing in nature and each other. In old language we might say that they made a pilgrimage.

St. James the Greater was one of Jesus's twelve apostles - a fisherman by trade, brother to John, and one of the first to leave everything behind to follow Christ. According to tradition, after preaching the Gospel in Jerusalem, St. James travelled west, possibly reaching as far as Spain. After his martyrdom around AD 44, his remains were said to have been transported back to Spain, where they were buried at what is now Santiago de Compostela - a city that would later become one of the most important Christian pilgrimage sites in the world.

Today, thousands of pilgrims still walk the Camino de Santiago (The Way of St. James) - some for faith, some for personal reflection, and many as a rite of spiritual passage. And at the heart of that journey is the symbol of the scallop shell.

In Christian tradition, the scallop shell is closely associated with St. James and pilgrimage. There are many layers to its symbolism:

Practical origins: Pilgrims to Santiago would carry scallop shells to scoop food and water, or as proof of completing the journey.

Spiritual imagery: The shell's grooves represent the many paths pilgrims take, all leading to a single point.

You may even spot scallop shells in our own St. James Church here in Milton Abbas, whether carved, painted, or embroidered - gentle reminders of the saint's legacy and the spiritual journey we all undertake.

Though Milton Abbas is far from the dusty trails of northern Spain, it has its own history of spiritual journeying. The current church replacing the medieval church nearer the abbey and placing this new structure at the heart of village life.

St. James Church today continues to welcome all - pilgrims, parishioners, and visitors alike. Next time you're passing, why not pop in and see the purple robed figure of St James in the stained glass windows, surrounded by scallop shells.
